Welcome to the Bayou Teche National Water and Paddle Trail-one of the country's exemplary waterways. The Atchafalaya River and the Bayou Teche are Louisiana's most historic and culturally significant waterways.

- The Bayou Teche was the course of the Mississippi River here 4,000 to 5,000 years ago.
- The Chitimacha Tribe of Louisiana inhabited the Teche, relied on its resources, and contributed the Legend of the Bayou Teche.
- Creoles of Louisiana are of black, white or mixed European, African, and Native American ancestry and they embrace their history and culture.
- The exiled Acadians—the Cajuns' ancestors—found refuge, settled, and thrived here.
- America's economy, from the late 1700s through today, has relied on the natural and human resources of the Atchafalaya and the Teche.
- Creole, Cajun French, and Native American
 Languages are speken berg.
- The music indigenous to the Atchafalaya and Teche region includes Cajun, Creole, zydeco, and swamp pop. Tune to local radio stations and visit nearby dance halls to experience the homeorym music
- Locals harvest frogs, crawfish, and catfish for personal consumption.

The best way to enjoy and appreciate the bayou's wonder is to paddle, drive, or bike its scenic, natural, historic, and cultural corridor. Be sure to visit all 16 Trail Towns along the Teche and the Atchafalaya.

Then, you will see and feel why the U.S. Secretary of the Interior recognized this corridor as a National Water Trail in 2015.



Tips for your Time on the Teche

- Some boat landings are in rural areas and are
- Tell someone about your paddling plans before you leave.
- Always use personal flotation devices.
- Carry water, sunscreen, and bug repellent.
- Check weather conditions and be aware of current water conditions and flood stages.
- You may encounter crawfish traps, crab traps, float lines, and jig/jug lines in the water. Respect and leave untouched this private property.
- If you see a motorboat, remember to turn your bow into the wake.
- Park in designated areas making sure not to block driveways or interfere with traffic.
- Be courteous to other bayou users.
- Follow the laws and rules of the area
- Look after the natural environment: avoid damaging the bayou banks and vegetation.
- Protect native species and habitats.
- Keep Louisiana Beautiful! Don't litter and take
